


In December we visited the truly blessed by following the history and story as told by

The club was inspected by our Area Coordinator, Olga Slocum, on December 2. She is always amazed at how much our small club accomplishes and plans.






Kids' Korner





Our Shared Values

Divine Worship

Our congregational worship celebrations each Sabbath are God-glorifying, driven by biblical principles, and shared in an atmosphere of loving fellowship.

e come together, week by week, to turn our attention towards our Creator and God. Like Christians everywhere, we come together as a congregation to worship. Not many years ago, there was little difference in style or structure between us and neighboring Adventist churches. Then as we built our church home, we set out to rebuild our worship on a biblical model and with a style that would be uniquely ours.

The Elders Board began the process with a scriptural study on worship to lay the foundations for what would follow. We explored the context of worship and the different forms in which worship occurred. Next, we looked at how those foundations could be expressed in contemporary culture and thinking. In seeking to make worship relevant to modern thinking, we wanted to remain firmly grounded with biblical worship.

These studies became the starting point for a broadly representative worship committee that discussed how to make Merrimack Valley worship unique and attractive, and not just a carbon copy of the churches in surrounding districts. As we considered each aspect of what is now our worship service, we looked at how it would fit within the foundations of scripture.

We used our Shared Values as building blocks upon that foundation. From Loving Fellowship and Evangelistic Growth we agreed that worship must reach out to those who are not members. In doing so we create an environment that is welcoming and that values all who come through our doors. Gifted Ministries demand that we extend opportunities for worship leadership to as many participants as possible.

Worship at Merrimack Valley draws visitors to our doors because it resonates with relevance and integrity. Our willingness to share the leadership roles contributes to the cultural diversity that we experience each week. Our blended worship brings a vitality of contemporary style that is comfortable even to the traditionalists among us. But most importantly we gather each week, not to receive a handout of blessings, but to bring our praise and worship to offer to God who created and redeemed us.



Southwestern Vegetable Stew

- 1 Tablespoon oil
- 1 medium onion, coarsely chopped
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/2 lb. new red potatoes, cut into 1/2-inch cubes (1-1/2 cups)
- 1/2 cup Green Giant "Niblets" frozen corn
- 1/4 cup chopped red bell pepper
- 1 (14.5-oz. can white hominy, drained, rinsed
- 1 (14.5-oz.) can ready-to-serve vegetable broth
- 1 (4.5-oz.) can Old El Paso "Chopped Green Chiles"
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- 1/2 teaspoon dried oregano leaves
- 1 medium zucchini, quartered lengthwise, cut into 1/4-inch slices (1 cup)
- 4 teaspoons chopped fresh cilantro

Heat oil in large saucepan over medium-high heat until hot. Add onion and garlic; cook 2 to 3 minutes or until onion is crisp-tender and garlic just begins to brown, stirring frequently.

Add all remaining ingredients except zucchini and cilantro. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 10 minutes.

Add zucchini; simmer uncovered an additional 8 to 10 minutes or until zucchini is tender. Sprinkle with cilantro.

Makes 4 (1-1/4 cup) servings

Prep Time: 20 minutes (Ready in 40 minutes)
