



It's been a busy few months at Edgewood/GBA. Perhaps the biggest news is that the school successfully went through an accreditation evaluation conducted by the General Conference Board of Regents. A team of eleven educators from the Southern and Atlantic Union spent four days on campus investigating the program and facilities. Prior to this, the board and staff had conducted its own self-study, writing up the results in a report of nearly 200 pages. The committee was impressed with many aspects of the program and commended the board, administration, staff, and faculty for offering a quality program of Christian education. They were also impressed with the support from the constituency and area churches, including Merrimack Valley. The school would not survive without the prayers and financial support of so many.

May and early June will also be busy for the school. A number of events are open to family and friends, including the Science Fair and Exhibition on May 22 at 6:30 p.m., Youth Church on May 24 with Sabbath School starting at 10 a.m., the Spring Concert on May 29 at 7 p.m., Eighth Grade Graduation on June 1, at 1 p.m., and Senior Graduation weekend June 6-8. Consecration is Friday at 8 p.m., Baccalaureate is Sabbath at 11 a.m., and Commencement is Sunday at 1 p.m.

Graduation services are at the Stoneham Memorial Church; all other programs are in the EW/GBA gymnasium.

This summer, we are offering Day Camp for ages 4-12, beginning June 16 through August 8. Registration is \$50; tuition is \$100 per week or \$30 per day. We will also be offering Reading Camp, Math Camp, and Basketball Camp. Dates and times for these three camps will be announced in the church bulletin. Be watching for that information soon, or call the EW/GBA office at 781-438-4253 if you are interested.

We are currently accepting applications for the 2008-2009 school year. We have added another elementary classroom, with Mrs. Grace Mercado as the teacher. Classrooms are filling up quickly, though, so call now for an application!




Sabbath School News

Recipes

Sesame Noodle Soup (98 calories - serves 6)

4 oz whole-wheat or 50-percent whole-wheat angel hair pasta

4 1/2 cups fat-free, no salt added vegetable broth

1T peeled and minced fresh ginger

1/8 t red pepper flakes

1 cup fresh snow peas, halved diagonally

4 oz white mushrooms, brushed clean and sliced (about 1 1/4 cups)

4 cups chopped fresh spinach or baby spinach leaves

1/2 t dark sesame oil

1/4 c thinly sliced green onions



Bring a large pot 3/4 full of water to a boil. Add pasta and cook until al dente, about 7 minutes, or according to package directions. Drain the pasta thoroughly and set aside.

In a large saucepan, combine the broth, ginger and red pepper flakes, bring to a boil over medium-high heat. Add the snow peas and mushrooms and cook, uncovered, until the vegetables are softened, about 1 minute. Add the spinach, sesame oil, and pasta and cook until the spinach wilts, about 30 seconds. Ladle the soup into individual bowls and sprinkle with the green onions.

Apple, Raisin and Almond Salad (106 calories -- Serves 6 -- kid friendly)

1/4 c slivered almonds

2 Gala or McIntosh apples, halved, cored, and cut into 3/4 inch pieces

2 Granny Smith apples, halved, cored, and cut into 3/4 inch pieces

1 celery stalk, thinly sliced

1/2 c red seedless grapes, cut in half'

1/4 c golden raisins

1/2 c low-fat yogurt

6 Bibb lettuce leaves

Put the almonds in a small, dry, nonstick frying pan over medium-low heat. Cook, stirring constantly, until lightly toasted (or toast in toaster oven) for about 2 minutes. Transfer to plate and set aside.



In a large bowl, combine the apples, celery, grapes, raisins, and yogurt and stir to mix well. To serve, place a lettuce leaf on each of 6 plates and divide the apple mixture evenly among the lettuce leaves. Sprinkle with the toasted almonds just before serving so the nuts remain crisp.

Family New Beginnings Day




Sabbath, May 3 was filled with special family events. The church service was overflowing with family participation. The sermon was presented by
