The Merrimack Valley Church is sponsoring a spiritual renewal campaign in the early months of next year to help us discover and implement our purpose in life. The Forty Days of Purpose campaign will help us understand God's purposes for us in worship, fellowship, Christian growth, ministry, and evangelism. In our Sabbath worship services, sermons, small groups, and personal devotions we will experience renewed spiritual vitality. Our church and its ministries will become focused and energized. Our lives will be filled with meaning and purpose.

As we prepare for this special opportunity I have four requests to make of you: (1) Clear your calendar as much as possible for this January 8 - March 5, 2005 event. (2) Attend each of the Sabbath Worship Services during this series. When you are absent, be sure to get a taped copy of the service and listen to it. (3) Engage in the daily devotional reading program that will be provided for you. Study these Bible messages for yourself. (4) Plan to become an active member of one of the small groups that will meet over a six-week period.

In the average life span there are 25,550 days. I invite you to take 40 days to discover God's purpose for the rest of your life ahead. Knowing God's purpose for your life will enable you to understand the big picture -- how all the pieces of your life fit together. Having this perspective will reduce your stress, simplify your decisions, increase your satisfaction, and most important--prepare you for eternity.

Confession-Forgiveness

In the last issue we talked that there is a Savior who is eagerly waiting, not only for us to feel regret for our sins, but also for us to experience a fundamental change in our thinking that will result in restored purpose and changed perspective. It is God's kindness that leads us towards repentance (Rom. 2:4). But before we talk about revival as I had planned, the Lord impressed me to explore the avenue of forgiveness.

Repentance includes sorrow for sin, and a turning away from it. We will not renounce sin unless we see its sinfulness. Until we turn away from it in heart, there will be no real change in life. Sincere confession is essential. If you have given offense to your friend or neighbor, you are to acknowledge your wrong, and it is his duty freely to forgive you. Then you are to seek forgiveness of God, because the brother you have wounded is the property of God, and in injuring him you have sinned against his Creator. True confession is always of a specific character, and acknowledges particular sins. They may be of such in nature as to be brought before God only, they may be wrongs that should be confessed to individuals who have suffered injury through them, or they may be of a public character, and should then be publicly confessed. But all

confession should be definite and to the point, acknowledging the very sins of which you are guilty. Many, many confessions should never be spoken in the hearing of humans, for the result is that which the limited judgment of finite beings does not anticipate. God will be better glorified if we confess the secret, inbred corruption of the heart to Jesus alone than if we open its recesses to finite, erring man, who cannot judge righteously unless his heart is constantly imbued with the spirit of God. Do not pour into human ears a story that God alone should hear. Your sins may be as mountains before you, but if you humble your heart, and confess your sins, trusting in the merits of a crucified and risen Savior, He will forgive, and will cleanse you from all unrighteousness. (FLB- 128, The Faith I Live By)

He who is unforgiving cuts off the very channel through which he alone can receive mercy from God. We should not think that unless those who have injured us confess the wrong, we are justified in withholding from them our forgiveness. It is their part, no doubt, to humble their hearts by repentance and confession, but we are to have a spirit of compassion toward those who have trespassed against us, whether or not, they confess their faults. However sorely they may have wounded us, we are not to cherish our grievances and sympathize with ourselves over our injuries, but as we hope to be pardoned for our offenses against God, we are to pardon all who have done evil to us (MB 113).

God's forgiveness is not merely a judicial act by which He sets us free from condemnation. It is not only forgiveness for sin, but reclaiming from sin. It is the outflow of redeeming love that transforms the heart. David had the true conception of forgiveness when he prayed, "Create in me a clean heart, Oh God, and renew a right spirit within me". (Ps. 51:10) And again he says, "As far as the east is from the west, so far has He removed our transgression from sin". (Ps. 103:12) God in Christ gave Himself for our sins. He suffered the cruel death of the cross, bore for us the burden of guilt, "the just for the unjust" that He might reveal to us His love and draw us to Himself. And He says, "be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God in Christ also forgave you". (Eph. 4:32)

Let Christ, the divine Life, dwell in you and through you reveal the heaven-born love that will inspire hope in the hopeless and bring heaven's peace to the sin-stricken heart. As we come to God, this is the condition that meets us at the threshold, that, receiving mercy from Him, we yield ourselves to reveal His grace to others. Satan is working by every deception he can command in order that we may not discern that love. He will lead us to think that our mistakes and transgressions have been so grievous, that the Lord will not hear our prayers and will not bless and save us. In ourselves we see nothing but weakness, nothing to recommend us to God, and Satan tells us that it is of no use, we cannot remedy our defects of character. When we try to come to God, the enemy will whisper, it is of no use for you to pray, did you not do that evil thing? Have you not sinned against God and violated your own conscience? But we may tell the enemy that "the blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin". (1John 1:7) When we feel that we have sinned and cannot pray, then is the time to pray. We must pray and believe. Paul says in 1 Tim. 1:15 that "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief". Forgiveness, reconciliation with God, comes to us not as a reward for our works, it is not bestowed because of the merit of sinful man, but it is a gift to us.

On Sunday, January 14, 2001, just as we were leaving the convenience store parking lot a dark-haired woman in her fifties, dressed rather 'housewifely', knocked on our car window. As the woman, wrapping her arms protectively around herself spoke; my companion opened his door and stepped out to listen. I couldn't hear the conversation, but I could sense his air of uncertainty, and her apprehension. What was going on? We weren't in a great neighborhood. Maybe she was scamming him. Curiosity pulled me, but even more so, the anxiety I saw on her face. I opened the window and intruded on their conversation. She volunteered that she was locked out of her car, and had walked to the gas station only to be turned away. She was not from this area, and didn't know what to do. I asked if there was someone we could call for her. No, she said, she lived more than an hour away. Her obvious tenseness led me to remember times when I've been alone, needed help, and felt a bit panicky.

My companion appeared perplexed as to what we could do to help. Suddenly I remembered, "don't you have one of those jimmy sticks, or whatever they call them, to break into cars?" He said he used to but wasn't sure if he still had it. After searching the car he found it, a bit bent but still serviceable. They crossed the street together and within eight minutes he returned to our car. He told me she'd thanked him profusely and had repeated several times, in a slightly accented voice, "God bless you, sir; God bless you".

We started driving away, feeling glad we could help, and I saw her exiting McDonald's. Seeing us, she waved and mouthed 'thank you', with a man, probably in his eighties, leaning on her arm. It was then my companion told me the 'rest of the story'. She'd told him she lived in Worcester and had driven to Lawrence to take her father to a church event he wanted to attend. While helping him from the car to enter the restaurant, she'd securely locked both doors. It was only as she prepared to leave McDonald's that she realized her keys were still in the ignition. The few church folk, who'd joined them there, had already left and she knew no one in the area. Truly, she'd found herself in a precarious situation. Desperate, not really knowing what to do, she ventured across the street and that's when she met us. Yet, of ALL the cars in that store's parking lot, she stopped at **OURS** to ask for help. I remarked on that "seeming" coincidence, and the fact that her last words to him were, "God bless you, sir". Beyond doubt, we'd been in the presence of God's Holy Spirit. Truly, God that day was watching over his children who'd just left His House!

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Fruit and Spice Rounds

Ingredients: 2 cups flour 1 tsp. baking soda 1 tsp. Salt 1 tsp. ground cinnamon ¾ tsp. ground cloves ½ tsp. ground nutmeg 1 cup raisins

1 cup dried figs
 1 cup pitted whole dates
 ½ cup broken walnuts
 1 cup butter or margarine
 1 ½ cups sugar
 3 eggs
 Vanilla icing

Directions:

Combine 1st six ingredients in the left hand column. In a food processor, grind the raisins, figs, dates and walnuts. In a large mixing bowl beat the butter or margarine and sugar until fluffy. And eggs one at a time until mixed well. And flour until mixed well. Stir in fruit mixture. Divide dough in half. Cover and chill several hours or overnight.

On a well-floured surface roll dough ¼ inch thick. Cut into rounds with a 2 ½-inch cookie cutter. Place on a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a 375-degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes or till done. Cool on cookie sheet for 2 to 3 minutes, then remove and cool thoroughly before drizzling with Vanilla Icing. Yield = approximately 60 cookies

Apricot Twists

Ingredients: 2 cups flour 1/3 cup sugar ½ tsp. Salt ½ tsp. Ground mace ¼ tsp. Baking powder

% cup butter or margarine
5 to 7 tbsp ice water
¼ tsp. Lemon extract
¼ cup apricot preserves
Milk

Directions:

Combine 1st five ingredients in the left hand column. Cut in butter or margarine till mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Combine 1 tbsp of the ice water and the lemon extract and sprinkle over part of the mixture. Gently toss with a fork and push to side of bowl. Repeat with remaining ice water, a tbsp at a time, till all is moistened. Form into a ball. Cover and chill about 30 minutes or till easy to handle. Divide dough into quarters. Roll quarters into 12x4 inch rectangles. Spread two with preserves, and cover with remaining 2 rolled quarters. Trim edges. Cut each rectangle into twelve 4x1 inch strips. Twist each strip twice. Place on an ungreased cookie sheet. Bake in a 375-degree oven for 15 minutes. Remove and brush with milk, then sprinkle with additional sugar. Return to oven and bake 5 to 8 minutes more or till done. Remove and cool. Yield: 24 cookies

Sour Cream Spice Knots

- Ingredients: 2 ¾ cups flour ½ tsp. Baking soda ¼ tsp. salt ¼ tsp. Ground nutmeg 2 tbsp sugar ½ tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ cup butter or margarine
 1 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1 tsp vanilla
 ½ cup sour cream

Directions:

Combine 1st 4 ingredients in the left hand column. In a small bowl combine 2 tbsp sugar and the cinnamon and set aside. In a large mixing bowl beat butter or margarine and sugar until fluffy. And egg and vanilla and beat well. Add flour mixture and sour cream alternately, beating till well mixed. Divide dough in half. Cover and chill at least 2 hours or till easy to handle.

Roll dough 1/8 inch thick. Cut into rings with a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch doughnut cutter. Twist rings once to form figure eights. Place 2 inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Sprinkle with cinnamon-sugar mixture. Bake in a 350-degree oven for 6 to 8 minutes or till done. Remove and cool.

Yield: 60 cookies

Old-Fashioned Sugar Cookies

Ingredients: 4 ½ cups flour 2 tsp. Baking powder 1 tsp. Baking soda ½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. Ground nutmeg 1¼ cups shortening

2 cups sugar 2 eggs 1 tsp vanilla ½ tsp lemon extract 1 cup buttermilk

Directions:

Combine 1st five ingredients in the left hand column. In a large mixing bowl beat shortening for 30 seconds. Add sugar and beat till fluffy. Add eggs, vanilla and lemon extract and beat well. Add flour mixture and buttermilk alternately to shortening mixture, beating till well mixed. Divide in half. Cover and chill at least 3 hours or till easy to handle.

Roll dough ½ inch tick. Cut into rounds with a 3-inch cookie cutter. Place 2 ½ inches apart on an ungreased cookie sheet. Sprinkle with additional sugar. Bake in a 375-degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes or till done. Remove and cool.

Yield: 24 cookies

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




