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Justification on a Plane—Part 2

"I'm glad that I don't have to fly anymore today." That's what the Captain of the plane, the pilot, said after the injured passengers disembarked the plane.

I remember thinking, "thanks, I still have to fly to Texas in an hour."

Flying was the last thing I wanted to do. In fact, I was determined not to fly. I was sitting in Chicago's O'Hare, trying to figure out how <u>not</u> to fly. "I'll rent a car. I don't care how much it costs. I'm keeping my feet on the ground!" I said to myself.

You may recall in part 1 of "Justification on a Plane," that I thought the plane was going to crash, and I was going to die. In that moment, I realized, in a very real way, that I had nothing to present to God that qualified me for heaven except the perfect righteousness of Jesus! The Bible calls it justification by faith (Romans 3:23, 24).

When you receive Christ as your Savior, He also becomes your Lord! You've joined His team. As the captain of the team, He's continuously working in your life for his purposes. While I was sitting in the airport trying to figure out how to get home, I began to have a dialogue in my head that went something like this: "Wait a minute. Check out the weather report. Maybe the plane will be flying in good weather? The plane I'm flying in is a large jet, not a prop-propelled plane!" As I looked back on it, to me, that was the Spirit helping me to regain the courage to fly, not drive, home.

My team Captain was working His leadership into my life. Just as we are dependent on Christ to qualify us for heaven (justification), we are also dependent on Him to live according to His purposes on earth (sanctification)! At first I was not open to the idea of flying ever again, especially not that day. But my Captain began working. He met me where I was. Then began guiding me to where He wanted me to be. I boarded the plane. My flight home to San Marcos, Texas, via San Antonio, was smoooooth flying!







Innkeepers' Supper Mock Chicken Casserole

Ingredients:

- 2 cups Frichick or Morning Star Chicken Strip Starters, cut in small pieces
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/2 cup minced onion
- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 3/4 cup sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 3/4 cup slivered almonds
- 1 (10 1/2 ounce) can cream mushroom soup
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup dry herb-seasoned stuffing mix, crushed
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Spray a 9-inch by 13-inch baking pan.



In a bowl, mix all ingredients except the stuffing mix and cheese. Put this mixture in the baking dish. In another bowl, combine the stuffing mix and cheese, sprinkle over the top of the chicken mixture. Bake 'til bubbly hot (uncovered), about 25 to 35 minutes.

Edgewood Elementary/Greater Boston Academy News

"Be More..." That's the theme this year at Edgewood/Greater Boston Academy. A bulletin board in the foyer of the school announces that EW/GBA students will "Be More...Respectful, Curious, Involved, Knowledgeable, and Christ like." But that list just touches the surface. While faculty and students are making a conscious effort to accomplish the stated five goals, other points of emphasis surface on a daily basis with the result that EW/GBA is truly more than it's ever been before.

Students who have attended the school longer than the current year have commented that this year is "different." They say that students are "calmer," that they are more "spiritually enthusiastic," that they are more focused academically. Faculty senses a difference, too. At the mid-point of the first quarter, there were fewer "down" grades and more students headed towards the honor roll published at the end of October. One student, senior James Harper, scored high enough on his PSAT test that he qualified as a semi-finalist for a National Merit Scholarship. Harper earned the 14th highest score out of the 55,000 students who took the test nationally. He is in the running for one of the 10,000 scholarships totaling more than \$50 million given to undergraduate students.

The last full week of October, the EW/GBA faculty conducted a Week of Prayer for their students. Eleven teachers gave their testimony throughout the week, Edgewood teachers sharing with Edgewood students, GBA teachers sharing with GBA students. They each emphasized the one of five aspects of the school theme while illustrating it with their own experiences. Friday's meeting brought the entire school together with the older students sitting with their little brothers and sisters.

balancing and helping to move the A-frame with ropes. Anyone who slacks causes the A-frame and the person in it to fall.


The King's Kids won a first place blue ribbon for the weekend.


